Psalm 50.1-8, 23-24

1 The Lord our God, the Mighty One, has spoken: and summoned the earth, from the rising of the sun to its setting in the west.

2 From Zion, perfect in beauty:

God has shone out in glory.

3 Our God is coming, he will not keep silent:

before him is devouring fire, and tempest whirls about him.

4 He calls to the heavens above:

and to the earth, so he may judge his people.

5 `Gather to me my faithful ones:

those who by sacrifice made a covenant with me.'

6 The heavens shall proclaim his righteousness:

for God himself is judge.

7 Listen my people, and I will speak:

O Israel, I am God vour God, and I will give my testimony.

8 `It is not for your sacrifices that I reprove you:

for your burnt-offerings are always before me.

23 `O consider this, you who forget God:

lest I tear you in pieces, and there be no one to save you.

24 `He honours me who brings sacrifice of thanksgiving:

and to him who keeps to my way I will show the salvation of God.'

From the Locum Tenens Rector Psalm 50.1-8, 23-24

The poem is not a prayer nor a lament but a prophetic admonition to the people of God about true and false worship. God speaks directly to the people about worship and faithfulness.

Today we read only a small selection of the psalm and that selection is all but meaningless without reading verses 7-21 which contains the substance of God's charge against the people's worship and behaviour.

God summons his people and all the earth to appear before him (1-2) to hear what he has to say. In the city of God, the beautiful Jerusalem, God shines as an overpowering light (see 2Corinthians 4.6). Light attracts attention and that is why it is associated with glory but it also helps us see what is there and perhaps that is its greatest glory. God is about to light up Israel's darkest corners. God comes and speaks about what God sees in the bright light of his character (3-6) and it will be like hot fire and a cyclone. In verse 21 we see that the people have mistaken God's silence on their behaviour as collusion with it. Three themes that God wishes to address with his people are sacrifice and covenant (5) and their faithfulness to the covenant.

God begins his charge against the people (7-8) in a solemn way reminding them of his covenant name and then addresses the issue of sacrifice. At this point our reading leaves us.

Read on and see what God says about sacrifice and worship. God does not need such things; he is the creator after all. Worship is not to sustain the deity, as in paganism, but to offer thanks and praise for God's friendship.

Having addressed the nature of worship God turns his light on their covenant unfaithfulness (16-21). They reject the word of God; they prefer the friendship of thieves, adulterers and slanderers, liars and deceivers to that of God. God's character is the pattern for human social life. Everything must be in the

right relationship. The psalm uses threatening and accusatory language which most people find unacceptable today and therefore we miss the point the psalm is making: friendship with God means justice and compassion for all. The psalm concludes with the offer of another way (23-24). Understanding must replace misunderstanding; justice and right relations must replace their present socially destructive ways. God will always save.

PRAYERS

- . We pray for our children and young families. We pray we find someone to minister to them and we give thanks for the opportunities we have in this Parish. **Amen.**
- . Bountiful God, give to this parish a faithful pastor who will faithfully speak your word and minister your sacraments; an encourager who will love and care for us all, who will equip your people for ministry and enable us to fulfil our calling. Give to those who will choose, wisdom, discernment and patience, and to us give warm and generous hearts, for Jesus Christ's sake. **Amen**.
- . God of mercy, we know that you remember the homeless, the destitute, the disadvantaged and those who have no-one to care for them. In our efforts to minister to their needs we thank you for the ministry of Revd. Robin Moore at Northbourne Community Centre and we pray that you will guide us to secure funding in this time of great financial stress. For Jesus' sake. **Amen**.
