Psalm 71.1-6

- 1 To you, Lord, have I come for shelter: let me never be put to shame.
- 2 In your righteousness rescue and deliver me: incline your ear to me and save me.

3 Be for me a rock of refuge, a fortress to defend me:

for you are my high rock, and my stronghold.

4 Rescue me, O my God, from the hand of the wicked:

from the grasp of the pitiless and unjust.

5 For you, Lord, are my hope:

you are my confidence, O God, from my youth upward.

6 On you have I leaned since my birth:

you are he that brought me out of my mother's womb, and my praise is of you continually.

From the Locum Tenens Rector Psalm 71.1-6

This prayer for help is a fine response to Jeremiah's call and ministry. If you read the whole psalm carefully you may discern that this is a prayer for help by an older person (5, 9, 17-18). Someone has suggested it may be the lament of an ageing musician! The writer has experienced something of the illness associated with old age and his enemies have taken advantage of that time of weakness. They have used his time of illness to humiliate and persecute him. It is possible that the 'enemies' were very pious people who believed that illness was a punishment for sin and that the sufferer was a sinner who deserved punishment (see verse 11 and compare it with Job19.13-21).

In the section we read today the pleas for help are interspersed with expressions of trust as a basis for hope in God's action (1-6). The first three verses express the nature of living faith as counter-intuitive trust and its grounds in the character of God for whom the right is everything Psalm 31.1-3a). The poet looks to God as a rock of habitation or refuge, a place in which to live as a refugee from the wicked, a place of protection and safety.

The wicked, unjust and the cruel may be on his case and they may be too strong for him, but from his earliest days he has found God to be a sure stronghold (4-6). Like Jeremiah he knows that his trust is exercised and proclaimed on contested ground. The wicked will not just go away but will live their lives and have their victories publicly; they even control the public arena. Faith lives amid adversity as in Jeremiah and Jesus so it must be lived in hope. Hope is linked to trust and confidence which means the author believes that he still has a future in God. Hope in the Psalms is not wishful thinking but is a God-inspired certainty that God will help and deliver, be a place of habitation and rescue (Jeremiah 29.11).

Question: Read the whole psalm. What does it tell you about the spiritual tasks of older people? How does that challenge or encourage you? We like to think of God as our refuge, our safe habitation. Apply that to refugees in this country?
