6 May he come down like rain upon the new-mown fields: and as showers that water the earth.

7 In his time shall righteousness flourish:

and abundance of peace, till the moon shall be no more. 18 Let his name live for ever:

and endure as long as the sun.

19 Let all peoples use his name in blessing:

and all nations call him blessed.

20 Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel:

who alone does great wonders.

21 Blessed be his glorious name for ever:

and let the whole earth be filled with his glory. Amen, Amen.

# From the Locum Tenens Rector

## Psalm 72 1-7, 18-21

This psalm originates as a prayer for the King perhaps at a coronation. You can imagine why they prayed this way when you take into account the actual behaviour of the majority Israel's and Judah's kings! The two key words of this psalm are justice and righteousness and as these are the key to God's character; they were to be the means and the goals of the reign of God's agent, the king (1-7).

Righteousness is not primarily a moral term but a relational one. The righteous in the psalms is not someone who is morally superior and whose morally superior behaviour lays an obligation on God to reward them. The righteous are those who acknowledge their dependence on God for life and the future. Their happiness comes from God's love, faithfulness and forgiveness. In other words, they rejoice that God, in his grace, has acted to put things to right even if they do not deserve it. The opposite of the righteous is the self-centred, self-directed and self-ruled.

Justice is putting the right into practice so that the king can be expected to

be on the side of the afflicted, the poor, the children and an implacable opponent of the oppressor. Such a one will bring a time of blessing and prosperity; it is not just the economy, stupid. Justice is essential for human happiness, here given in beautiful poetic lines of falling refreshing rain, and peace the necessary condition for human flourishing.

No wonder the psalmist prays for the long life of the king! Human abundance, which is the will of God, flows to human beings through the righteous and just king. Again the abundance of human flourishing expressed in vibrant pictures in 15-17 of wealth and food makes the picture very earthy. God wants human beings to flourish and good, just governance is the foundation. This righteous reign will be extended to the nations who will welcome it.

Jews and Christians alike have read this psalm messianically: one day the King will return and what a day it will be.

Question: Justice and righteousness are intrinsic to God's being. What part do they play in our lives? Use this psalm to reflect on the so-called 'prosperity gospel.' How does the psalm critique that teaching? How can we actualize the psalm's vision of peace?
