From the Rector

Dear Friends,

A person once asked a poet if he could explain in plain language what one of poems meant. The poet answered that if he could do that he wouldn't have written the poem!

If you came to Midnight Mass you would have heard the story of the manger, the shepherds, the angels; the story you expect to hear at Christmass; but none of that this morning. This morning we hear what this story means in the poetic prologue to John's gospel. It is like the second verse of O come all ye faithful – 'God of God, light of light, Lo he abhors not the virgin's womb, very God, begotten not created.' What John is telling us is that the Christmass story is all about God, the God who is love, spilling over into the world, not forcefully but coming from within, indeed from within us. Think of Hark the herald angels sing: 'Veiled in flesh the Godhead see, hail the incarnate deity, pleased as man with man to dwell...' These pieces of poetry in hymnody and scripture are endeavouring to speak of what is real. What God's reality is and what we are truly are.

We do live today in age of doubt, and this has occurred among other things because of the emptying of our language and our society of anything but number and calculation. More often than not we live today in an economy rather than a community. There is a tendency to exclude wonder and reverence as legitimate human responses to the world, we are isolated within our own limited and limiting goals and have ceased to speak of God.

Christmass is a time to be reminded who this is who has come among us and to see the world around us and those with whom we share it in new ways. This is difficult to describe, but I hope that our poets and hymnodists can help us along the way. Enjoy your singing and your celebrations and have a happy and holy Christmass.
