Psalm 71.1-6

1 To you, Lord, have I come for shelter:

let me never be put to shame.

2 In your righteousness rescue and deliver me: incline your ear to me and save me.

3 Be for me a rock of refuge, a fortress to defend me: for you are my high rock, and my stronghold.

4 Rescue me, O my God, from the hand of the wicked:

from the grasp of the pitiless and unjust.

5 For you, Lord, are my hope:

you are my confidence, O God, from my youth upward.

6 On you have I leaned since my birth:

you are he that brought me out of my mother's womb, and my praise is of you continually.

From the Locum Tenens Rector

Psalm 71.1-6

The psalm we read today is one of tremendous hope and assurance. It is a prayer for lifelong protection and help and it assumes that the life of faith is always lived in the midst of adversity even in to the vulnerabilities of old age (9). There is no easy retirement for the disciple but also, unlike the political and social elites, God does not forsake or cast off the ageing person.

We only read a small portion of the Psalm today but that illustrates its pattern. The psalmist finds himself in the midst of a world of cruelty, injustice and wickedness. It mocks the righteousness of God. The psalmist needs protection: Although a victim of cruelty, injustice and wickedness the writer does not wish to be put to shame by succumbing to cruelty, injustice and wickedness himself. The poet must trust in God's righteousness; that God will act justly and equitably for the poor and oppressed. In his righteousness God will rescue him (71:1-4).

From petition the psalmist turns to trust and praise (71.5-8). The psalmist has the conviction that from his birth he has belonged to God. Praise then is a lifestyle springing from the beautiful, intimate relationship with God. Praise is to declare against all common sense that the world is God's. Praise opens us up to the new ways God leads us in adversity and struggle.

A fruitful exercise is to draw the links between the other readings today; Jeremiah's fright at God's call, the gift of love to us in the Spirit, and Jesus' rejection and the crowd's desire for murder.
