Psalm 82

1 God has stood up in the council of heaven:

in the midst of the gods he gives judgement.

2 `How long will you judge unjustly:

and favour the cause of the wicked?

3 `Judge for the poor and fatherless:

vindicate the afflicted and oppressed.

4 `Rescue the poor and needy:

and save them from the hands of the wicked.

5 `They do not know, they do not understand, they walk about in darkness: all the foundations of the earth are shaken.

6 `Therefore I say, "Though you are gods:

and all of you children of the Most High,

7 `"Nevertheless you shall die like a mortal: and fall like one of the princes."

8 Arise, O God, and judge the earth:

for you shall take all nations as your possession.

From the Locum Tenens Rector Psalm 82

The theme of justice is pursued in this psalm of Asaph, a Levitical choir leader. This psalm takes a mythical and polytheistic framework that was common to Israel's neighbours and submits it to devastating criticism.

The myth is a meeting of the council of the many gods that strut the earth and El presides. In this myth the council governs the earth (1).

But in this psalm the LORD has overthrown El and puts them on trial as both prosecutor and judge (2-4). The question the LORD asks is: 'Have the gods administered justice in the earth?' The verdict – they have not.

Instead they have administered injustice to the weak, oppressed, helpless and poor. Their partiality is for the strong and the wicked. Injustice among humans and the gods violates God's will for the world (Leviticus 19.15). In verses 3-4 the LORD indicts the gods for allowing injustice to disorder the whole of human life. Justice and righteousness (the right) are not abstract principles but very concrete matters of human relationships. How we treat the weak, orphans, the lowly, destitute and the needy is the criteria that this prosecutor uses to judge the 'gods of the earth.'

The 'gods of the earth' do not shed life and light on human community but instead moral and spiritual darkness, lacking knowledge and insight (5). The world teeters because it has no foundation in just relations with each other. Because the gods have failed in their prime responsibility to create the conditions for justice and the right the LORD strips them of their divinity; they are to become like mortals and die. They are no better than the princes who worship them (6-7). This is a devastating critique of all ideological religion; religion that has been captured by an ideology that shows partiality to the wicked and the powerful. The gods must face death because they have been unable to give life. The LORD alone rules the nations and holds them

accountable to exercise justice and uphold the rights of the weak. The psalmist calls on the LORD to rise up and rule the earth as it should be; in justice and by the right.

When peoples reject the LORD a power vacuum forms and other mythical deities fill it. The deities (name some in our secular mythology) that fill the vacuum usually elevate the economic survival of the few at the expense of justice and right for those who have no power. They create hierarchies of power and wealth. The God of Israel, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, has no such agenda.
