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Psalm 107.1-9, 43

1 O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good:

for his loving mercy is for ever.

2 Let the Lord's redeemed say so:

whom he has redeemed from the hand of the enemy,

- 3 And gathered in from every land, from the east and from the west: from the north and from the south.
- 4 Some went astray in the wilderness and in the desert:

and found no path to an inhabited city;
5 They were hungry and thirsty:

and their heart fainted within them.

6 Then they cried to the Lord in their distress:

and he took them out of their trouble.

7 He led them by the right path:

till they came to an inhabited city.

8 Let them thank the Lord for his goodness:

and for the wonders that he does for the children of Adam;

9 For he satisfies the thirsty:

and fills the hungry with good things.

43 Whoever is wise, let them observe these things:

and consider the loving-kindness of the Lord.

From the Locum Tenens Rector Psalm 107.1-9, 43

What a wonderful liturgical response this psalm is to Hosea; "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever.' The psalm is a thanksgiving liturgy in which four different experiences of distress are described (travellers 4-9; released prisoners 10-16; those recently healed from illness 17-22; and seafarers 23-32) and God's positive response to the cry for help is recounted. There is a concluding hymn (33-43) that extols God sovereignty over social and natural life. God is the God of reversals who turns every expectation we have of God on its head.

Psalm 107 is the first psalm in Book V of the Psalter and is a response to the theological crisis of the exile as expressed in Psalm 89, for example in 89.49 "Where is your steadfast love of old?"

A problem for those whom God has liberated from exile is that now they do not know how to experience God in their new situation. They have no freedom, temple, and king. The response of Psalm 107 is that God's steadfast love is always there and only needs to be called upon.

The first verse makes that affirmation and verses 2-3 are the response of the redeemed or those who have experienced God's power of reversal freeing them from their troubles and enemies and bringing them together from all corners. Return from exile creates a redeemed people who know God's steadfast love is forever. This affirmation and response is followed up by examples of god's great reversals.

The first example is a story of wilderness wanderings recalling the Exodus and return from exile (4-9) and the experience is that God leads, feeds, and slakes thirst in response to the cry for help. God provides the pathway and the city of refuge in which they find hospitality and safety. God's steadfast love is never far away. All that needs to be done is that people cry to the LORD.

The last verse of the psalm (43) requires a response from the reader. Have we understood the preceding hymn? Then we must apply it to our way of life. This is the path of wisdom. Dependence on the LORD'S steadfast love must become the basic principle of life. Living in God's loyal love, crying out to God, depending on God's power of reversal is life itself.

Question: This psalm sounds quaint in a world where we are taught that our security must be in planning, investment and management; that we must be in control. Where does the God of steadfast love fit in your life? How wise are you? How much is crying to God part of your life?

Holy Spirit, comforter of hearts, heal your people's wounds and transform our brokenness. Grant us courage and wisdom, humility and grace, so that we may act with justice and find peace in you. We ask this through Christ, our Lord.
