Psalm 146

1 Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, O my soul:

while I live I will praise the Lord;

2 While I have any being:

I will sing praises to my God.

3 Put not your trust in princes:

nor in flesh and blood, which cannot save.

4 For when their breath goes from them, they return again to the earth: and on that day all their thoughts perish.

5 Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob:

whose hope is in the Lord their God,

6 The God who made heaven and earth:

the sea, and all that is in them,

7 Who keeps faith for ever:

who deals justice to those that are oppressed.

8 The Lord gives food to the hungry:

and sets the captives free.

9 The Lord gives sight to the blind:

11 He upholds the widow and the fatherless:

as for the way of the wicked, he turns it upside down.

Psalm 146

As we move towards the end of the Psalter the themes of the closing psalms (146-150) centre around praise. In praise we publicly express our appreciation of the virtues, greatness or performance of someone or something. We can praise a person, an art work or even a car we have rebuilt. Praise celebrates what such things bring into our lives.

In the Psalms the psalmists publicly express their appreciation of the character, greatness and performance of the LORD. This particular psalm celebrates God's care for the world and its inhabitants.

The poet begins by asking the congregation to join him in praising the LORD (1-2). It begins and ends with this refrain. The psalmist finds what he is about to reveal is deserving of life-long praise. His whole life is devoted to celebrating the LORD.

Why would that be? Unlike the powerful of the earth, the 'princes', the

military, the economic managers, God's promises are utterly trustworthy. Humans who rule are mortal (3-4). Mortality limits their power and distorts their own view of themselves. This is a constant theme in scripture (Isaiah 31.1-3). They are not worthy of ultimate trust or praise.

On the other hand the entire universe is God's creation, including all the inhabitants of heaven, earth, and the sea (6).

This same creator has not wound the universe up and let it go. The LORD keeps faith with his creation and that means he has a keen interest in how human beings conduct themselves towards each other. The good of human society is a key feature of God's reign and it is too important to be left to mortals (7-9).

Providing justice for the oppressed, caring for the poor, releasing prisoners, and seeing to the needs of strangers and refugees, widows and orphans are God's standard of righteousness. Thus they are the standard for Israel. They are the values and standards that undergird any civilized society.

But they derive from the character of God and we cannot sustain them without finding in the LORD our hope and our help.

Singing God's praises is sometimes confined to worship times like Sunday morning. This psalmist is inviting us to live the praise all our lives. Praise is living. We sing our vocation, our duty, our delight as outlined in the psalm. We are people of praise as we live (verses 7-9). The hope expressed in the psalm is intellectually outrageous and subversive. The ministry of justice, hospitality, liberation, healing and compassion is the bane of the rulers of this world. That is why we shout in praise.

Question: How can we better praise God both in worship and our lives? How can we express the ministry of justice, hospitality, liberation, healing and compassion in our lives? How is praise subversive?
