Psalm 5.1-7

- 1 Hear my words, O Lord, give heed to my groaning: listen to my cry, you that are my king and my God.
- 2 In the morning when I pray to you, surely you will hear my voice: at daybreak I lay my prayers before you, and look up.
- 3 For you are not a God who takes pleasure in wickedness: nor can any evil dwell with you.
- 4 The boastful cannot stand in your sight: you hate all those that work mischief.
- 5 Those who speak lies you destroy: you abhor the treacherous, O Lord, and those that are stained with blood.
- 6 But because of your great goodness I will come into your house:

 I will bow down toward your holy temple in awe and fear of you.
- 7 Lead me, O Lord, in your righteousness, for my enemies lie in wait: make straight your way before me.

From the Locum Tenens Rector

Psalm 5

Psalm 5 is part of a series of morning and evening psalms (3-6) that reflect daily worship. It is a morning psalm. Its theme is that God cannot and will not abide the perpetrators of evil. He will see their wicked deeds even as he most surely will hear the cries of those victimized by evil.

The psalmist awakes at sunrise and his thoughts turn immediately to God his King. This is the central theme of the Psalter; God rules even when all the evidence seems to point the other way. The psalmist faces another day of his opponents' deceit, lies, bloodshed, boasting and slippery and yet seductive self-advertising (9). They are a danger to him and the world.

So his first call in the morning is for protection against such a way of life. The psalmist knows that such destructive behavior cannot be the way into the presence of the Holy One of Israel. The only way into that presence is the way of God's abundant steadfast love; God creates the pathway in his grace through his love. We do not come into that presence on our own merits. Prayer for protection against the destructive behaviour that turns all human relationships from justice (righteousness) to self-centred and self-absorbed narcissism is a prayer that recognizes how fragile we are. It is all too easy to go down this path and miss the path of God's covenant love and thus miss the Presence.

The psalm bears witness to God's opposition to such evil. God abhors people of bloodshed and deceit, two human activities that destroy human persons and communities and undermines justice. Given that religion often makes the news these days because followers of one god or another deceive and commit violence in the name of that god the followers of Israel's God, the Lord and Father of our Lord Jesus, need to reiterate again and again that God is implacably opposed to violence and deceit I human affairs.

Question: Is your prayer in the morning that this day you will walk in God's abundant steadfast love? Read the whole psalm. What speaks to you? **Colin**
