Psalm 104.26-36

26 Lord, how various are your works:

in wisdom you have made them all, and the earth is full of your creatures.

27 There is the wide, immeasurable sea:

there move living things without number, great and small;

28 There go the ships, to and fro:

and there is that Leviathan whom you formed to sport in the deep.

29 These all look to you:

to give them their food in due season.

Psalm 104

Psalm 104 celebrates God as Creator and provider and elaborates the central theme of the psalms; the cosmic reign of God. It is a creation hymn weaving together themes such as the LORD as creator, the joy in creation, the trustworthiness and sufficiency of the creation.

The section we read today celebrates the great, wondrous and many creatures God has put on land and sea. It celebrates the wild wonder of God's world, the joy that God has embedded in creation, and the everyday miracle of God's ongoing provision for and re-creation of the earth. On the day of Pentecost we use this psalm to celebrate the gift of God's Spirit to a small band of disciples who faced the question: 'Now Jesus is gone who are we?' And 'Where do we go from here?' The compilers of the

Psalter were asking a similar question: 'After the trauma of the exile with no king, temple and covenant who are we?'

At first glance it may seem that 104:30 has little to do with Pentecost, but just as the ancient people of God had to trust the creating, renewing Spirit of God so too does the church. Creation, renewal, reconciliation are the Spirit's defining characteristics as are mission and the power of the kingdom of God.

The only proper liturgical response is, "I will sing praise to my God while I have being." (35)

Question: If we placed more emphasis on the Lord's joyful intention and design in creation would that put climate change and ecological in a new and more fruitful perspective? Would we be more trustful? Would we see more clearly why God wants to restore creation and not destroy it?
