Psalm 8

1 O Lord our Governor:

how glorious is your name in all the earth!

2 Your majesty above the heavens is yet recounted:

by the mouths of babes and sucklings.

3 You have founded a strong defence against your adversaries:

to quell the enemy and the avenger.

4 When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers:

the moon and the stars which you have set in order,

5 What are we, that you should be mindful of us:

what are we, that you should care for us?

6 Yet you have made us little less than gods:

and have crowned us with glory and honour.

7 You have given us dominion over your handiwork:

and have put all things in subjection beneath our feet,

8 All sheep and oxen:

and all the creatures of the field,

9 The birds of the air and the fish of the sea:

and everything that moves in the pathways of the great waters.

10 O Lord our Governor:

how glorious is your name in all the earth! for my joy shall be in the Lord.

Psalm 8

Did you know that this psalm was the first biblical text to reach the moon? Apollo 11 left a silicon disc containing messages from 73 nations and the Vatican included this text. It has been described as a psalm for stargazers. I remember as a young person lying on my back in a field late at night and letting the stars overwhelm me with wonder.

This is a psalm in praise of God's cosmic sovereignty and it is the first such in the Psalter. The theme is clearly stated in 1a and 10. The centre of the psalm is the question of 5 and the clue to understanding the psalm is to hold the two ends and the centre together.

Psalm 8 begins with an exclamation of praise spoken directly to God so this poem is not a piece *about* God, an objective statement. Instead the writer penetrates the relationship between God and us. The five preceding psalms have cried out to the LORD for help with enemies of various kinds. Now the psalmist compels us to deal directly with the God we address for help. As he wanders out into the night, the wonder of creation strikes awe in the heart of the poet. However the psalmist is not overawed to the point that he feels insignificant or useless as happens much in today's world. Such ecstasy fuels trust and confidence because the poet sees beyond the heavenly beauty to the Beauty itself. These are but the work of God's fingers, not

something to be worshipped nor something to overwhelm us.

The psalm asserts the centrality of human beings as God's partners in being stewards of God's created order. Human beings are royalty; the crown of creation. Humans have a true, if bounded, sovereignty within the created order, bounded by God's sovereignty and loving care for the creation. Human sovereignty has the simple purpose of bringing the creation to its fullness in the praise of God.

To go beyond this, in self-rule and violent autonomy, is the essence of wickedness.

Question: How does this psalm help you reflect on our responsibilities for God's creation?
