Psalm 122

1 I was glad when they said to me:

`Let us go to the house of the Lord.'

2 And now our feet are standing:

within your gates, O Jerusalem;

3 Jerusalem which is built as a city:

where the pilgrims gather in unity.

4 There the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord:

as he commanded Israel, to give thanks to the name of the Lord.

5 There are set thrones of judgement:

the thrones of the house of David.

6 O pray for the peace of Jerusalem:

may those who love you prosper.

7 Peace be within your walls:

and prosperity in your palaces.

8 For the sake of my kindred and companions:

I will pray that peace be with you.

9 For the sake of the house of the Lord our God:

I will seek for your good.

From the Locum Tenens Rector Psalm 122

It is likely pilgrims on their way to Jerusalem sang or chanted Psalms 120-134 at designated points in the journey. They are called the Psalms of Ascents and form a distinct group in the Psalter. Psalm 122 is the third psalm in the group and the pilgrims have arrived at Jerusalem from a hostile dispersion (120) and an arduous journey (121).

As verses 1-2 make clear pilgrimage to Jerusalem was a very special experience. Joy and excitement were central to this experience. The pilgrim was glad to be invited and excited to arrive.

In Jerusalem the pilgrims could experience the power of the symbols of God's presence, protection and worship in the temple and the royal palace (3-4). The central consequence of the idea of Jerusalem expressed in its beauty and architecture was the covenant with David that bound Israel together. Jerusalem was like a sacrament, an instrument of grace, revealing what God's purposes of Israel were. It was as though 'the Lord is here' just as we may speak of presence in the celebration of the Eucharist. Under the royal governance of David they were promised the experience of the royal rule of God, God's kingdom; the rule of peace and justice. And for that they would unite in thanks to the LORD. We know that royal rulers in Israel were often bad so this is not a statement of what is but an act of trust of what God could and would do. All good worship takes the corrupt and frail present

and views it in the light of the LORD's future.

The Davidic kings were to protect justice and deliver, from the judgement seat, justice and mercy according to God's character (5). The result of such judgement would be the peace that God promises; wholeness and harmony, prosperity and security (6-9). Thus the pilgrim prays for the peace of Jerusalem, as it would guarantee peace in the whole land. However, the fact of the prayer implies that Jerusalem is not at peace. How modern is this? We use this psalm in Advent because of its focus both on the present (the state of Jerusalem) and the future (God's peace coming to Jerusalem). We remember that Christ wept for the city because it did not love peace and sought it in violent ways (Luke 19.45-46). We remember that Christ is now God's locus in space and time and God's future of peace for all nations.

Question: How does worship transform us to represent God's just and peaceable purposes in God's world? Do we pray for the peace of the church and city? Do we recognise the things that make for peace?
