Psalm 137.1-6

Response: How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?

 ${\bf 1}$ By the waters of Babylon we sat down and wept:

when we remembered Zion. 2 As for our harps we hung them up:

upon the trees that are in that land. R

3 For there those who led us away captive required of us a song:

and those who had despoiled us demanded mirth, saying `Sing us one of the songs of Zion.' ${\bf R}$

5 If I forget you, O Jerusalem:

let my right hand forget its mastery. R

6 Let my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth:

Psalm 137

Of all the psalms this must be the most troubling and difficult psalm to use in public worship because of its fearsome desire for revenge and the gruesome final verse (9). It is rarely used and it was quite startling to find it in the lectionary for this week. It is one of several imprecatory psalms, songs that invoke the wrath of God on foes.

One author has said: "The Bible is frequently criticized for exhibiting so much violence in its narratives.... Truly mythical texts are rooted in sacrificial violence, prescribe it, and shield us from awareness of our complicity in it. That is why they do not show it directly. The Bible makes violence visible, and therefore makes its victims uncomfortably visible too.... To wish to avert our eyes reflects a naïve confidence that we are in greater danger of being corrupted by the language than of falling prey to the sin it describes. The sensitivity to victims so often now turned against the Bible is itself rooted there." (S. Mark Heim) The poet sits beside the rivers of Babylon remembering the violence of the

Babylonians and the treachery of their cousins, Esau's descendants, the Edomites. The psalmist's muse has gone silent in deep dark despair as their captors and tormentors mock them to produce joyful lyrics and tunes for their predator's pleasure (1-4).

Of course they can't. They have experienced rape, pillage, murder, torture, and feel lost, hopeless and helpless. They are like an abducted child in the hands of an abuser who asks the victim to amuse him. But this poet swears that even in the deepest darkest night never to forget the Presence of the God (Jerusalem). Therein lies hope.

This psalm belongs among the victims; of child abuse or abduction, of Aleppo, Mosul or any other vile situations in the world where violent abusers rule. And this is the problem for us. Most of us have never been there. We do not know how we would cry out. This poet goes directly to God. He bundles up all the pain, the rage and the non-existent justice and hurls it at God who will act justly (7-9).

We Christians need to take this to the Cross because it breaks the spell of the myth of violence; that peace will come after violence. The innocent one, God the Word, is the victim of mob violence; and his death and resurrection declare to the world there should be no more victims. Babylon is not overcome by violence but by the Cross and resurrection.
