#### Psalm 65

1 You are to be praised, O God, in Zion:

to you shall vows be paid, you that answer prayer.

2 To you shall all flesh come to confess their sins:

when our misdeeds prevail against us, you will purge them away.

3 Blessed are those whom you choose and take to yourself to dwell within your courts:

we shall be filled with the good things of your house, of your holy temple.

4 You will answer us in your righteousness with terrible deeds, O God our saviour:

you that are the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the distant seas;

5 Who by your strength made fast the mountains:

you that are girded with power;

6 Who stilled the raging of the seas, the roaring of the waves:

and the tumult of the peoples.

7 Those who dwell at the ends of the earth are afraid at your wonders:

the dawn and the evening sing your praises.

8 You tend the earth and water it:

you make it rich and fertile.

9 The river of God is full of water:

and so providing for the earth, you provide grain for us all.

10 You drench its furrows, you level the ridges between:

you soften it with showers and bless its early growth.

11 You crown the year with your goodness:

and the tracks where you have passed drip with fatness.

12 The pastures of the wilderness run over:

and the hills are girded with joy.

13 The meadows are clothed with sheep:

and the valleys stand so thick with corn, they shout for joy and sing.

# From the Locum Tenens Rector Psalm 65

This communal hymn of thanksgiving was often associated with autumn harvest festival. It breaks into three parts, almost like three scenes in a one-act play. The first scene (1-4) gives thanks and praise for God's immeasurable forgiveness. God always answers the prayer for forgiveness even when our willful rebellion finally overwhelms us and we are caught in a raging sea of chaos and failure. But God does more than that. In forgiveness he provides the way into His presence, represented here by the temple. Such a God deserves not only our praise but our trust and obedience ("and to you shall vows be performed").

The second scene (5-8) widens the angle of vision from the people of God to the whole of creation; it begins with the Exodus (5) and takes in the whole world. The deliverance of Israel is ultimately for the sake of all creation. It gives hope

to all the earth. That hope is grounded in God's cosmic creative power. The cosmic creator plans universal deliverance for the creation and his power in creation shows that he is able. He controls the chaos (7) that rises with mighty overwhelming force. Unlike fragile humans it does not terrify him as it does us. We are left in awe.

The third scene (9-13) moves to God's acts of gracious provision. In this poem rain symbolizes that blessing and the consequences of growth of grain, hillsides overflowing with flocks and herds and the wilderness's wild beauty a breathtaking sight. Wagons crowd the rutted roads with the overflowing prosperity signs that all will eat in winter.

It is easy to see why people have used this psalm at times of harvest. In the USA it is often used at observances of the national Thanksgiving holiday. About that Reinhold Niebuhr wrote, "Thanksgiving becomes increasingly the business of congratulating the Almighty upon his most excellent co-workers, ourselves.... The Lord who was worshiped was not the Lord of Hosts, but the spirit of Uncle Sam, given a cosmic eminence for the moment which the dear old gentleman does not deserve."

When grace departs life and thanksgiving flees we are left with...?
