Psalm 91.1-6, 14-16

1 Those who dwell in the shelter of the Most High:

who abide under the shadow of the Almighty,

- 2 They will say to the Lord `You are my refuge and my stronghold: my God in whom I trust.'
- 3 For he will deliver you from the snare of the hunter: and from the destroying curse.
- 4 He will cover you with his wings, and you will be safe under his feathers: his faithfulness will be your shield and defence.
- 5 You shall not be afraid of any terror by night:

or of the arrow that flies by day,

6 Of the pestilence that walks about in darkness:

or the plague that destroys at noonday.

- 14 `You have set your love upon me,' says the Lord, `and therefore I will deliver you:
 - I will lift you out of danger, because you have known my name.
- 15 `When you call upon me I will answer you:

I will be with you in trouble, I will rescue you and bring you to honour.

16 `With long life I will satisfy you: and fill you with my salvation.'

From the Locum Tenens Rector

Psalm 91.1-6, 14-16

This ancient psalm (its original use long lost in history) is used in its present context to respond to the terrible tragedy of the exile predicted in Jeremiah (see also Palm 89 to which it is a clear response). It is an eloquent profession of faith (1-13) to which God responds with a beautiful affirmation (14-16). The message is simple: God provides security and the psalmist trusts that.

Ponder the expressive metaphors of God's protection in 1-2; shelter, shadow, refuge fortress. God provides asylum and protection for those who seek to live in that Presence or the shadow cast by the Presence. On such grounds God is worthy of total trust. But God not only provides a safe place for the psalmist. God also walks on the way, a companion on the way, providing a safe journey (3-6). At all times, night, day, darkness, noonday and in every danger and difficulty God is present. God is not only present but active on our behalf, seeking our good. God is faithful always to his covenant love towards his people and will never let them go. No time or circumstance is beyond God. No human, natural or demonic power can destroy God's people.

Trust is described as loving, as knowing intimately, and as calling on God as companion (14-16). The verbs associated with God's protecting presence are worth much meditation: God delivers, protects, is with us, rescues, honours, satisfies and shows salvation. The psalm deserves its central place in the life of

faith.

Question: Read the metaphors used to describe God in God's relation to us. Take time to meditate on them. How do they speak to you? Use the same method and consider the verbs used to describe God's actions for us and towards us. What do they tell you about God and yourself?

- Parish Council warmly welcomed the appointment of the Rev. Martin Johnson as the new Rector of St. Philips and very much looks forward to welcoming Martin and Susan in person to the Parish. The Council greatly appreciated the work of the Clergy Appointment Board and Rev. Colin's willingness during the long process to continue to serve as Locum.
