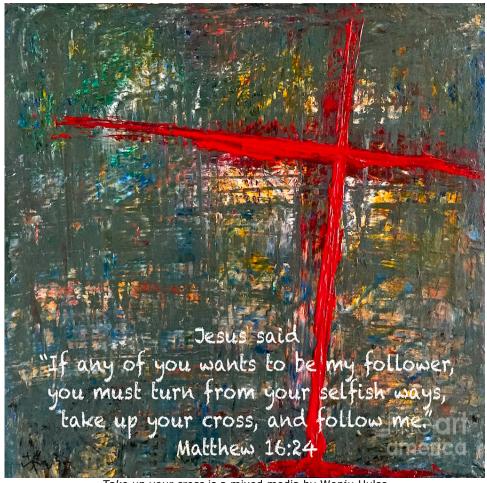


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Sunday 28 February 2021 Second Sunday in Lent

Dear Friends,

I hope you have found time to engage more closely with the readings during this Lenten season. Dr Colin Dundon has once again written a series of thought provoking reflections on the readings each Sunday (you can find them on the Parish Web site).

In today's reading from Genesis Dr Colin asks us to consider that during the great arc of 'salvation history' we find a movement away from land, kinship and temple. These were all at the heart of an understanding of what it was to be the people of God. All these things were destroyed or taken away and Jesus embodies the promise that these things offered, or many thought they offered.

What does the promise, the covenant of old offered to Abraham look like in the person of Jesus? Dr Colin writes:

Here are some ideas to mull over.

The covenant offers the gift of hope.

The covenant offers the gift of an eternal identity.

The covenant offers the **possibility of belonging and community.**

The covenant offers a clear and certain vocation.

Can you find those elements? How can these be a spiritual foundation for our adventure?

We can find this covenant renewed in our Eucharistic spirituality which is why the Eucharist is at the centre of what we do. Think on those elements that Dr Colin has highlighted for us and find them nestled in our weekly celebration together. It is this notion of 'Covenant Renewed' that lies at the very heart of the classic Anglican understanding of the Eucharist.

Lancelot Andrewes the Bishop of Winchester preached at Pentecost in 1610:

To a covenant there is nothing more requisite, than to put the seal. And we know the sacrament is the seal of the new covenant as it was of the old.

Many thanks to Dr Colin for his reflections and many thanks to Canon Scott for covering my absence this Sunday as Susan and I spend some long overdue time with family in Melbourne. I am not aware of any other parish that can draw upon such extraordinarily gifted folk! We are truly blessed.

Today's Readings

A reading from the book of Genesis (17:1-7, 15-16)

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, 'I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. ²And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous.' ³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, ⁴'As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁶I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. ⁷I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you. ¹⁵God said to Abraham, 'As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her.'

Psalm 22:24-32

O praise the Lord, all you that fear him: hold him in honour, O seed of Jacob, and let the seed of Israel stand in awe of him.

> For he has not despised nor abhorred the poor man in his misery: nor did he hide his face from him, but heard him when he cried.

From you springs my praise in the great congregation: I will pay my vows in the sight of all that fear you;

The meek shall eat of the sacrifice and be satisfied: and those who seek the Lord shall praise him may their hearts rejoice for ever!

Let all the ends of the earth remember and turn to the Lord: and let all the families of the nations worship before him.

For the kingdom is the Lord's: and he shall be ruler over the nations.

How can those who sleep in the earth do him homage: or those that descend to the dust bow down before him?

But he has saved my life for himself: and my posterity shall serve him.

This shall be told of my Lord to a future generation: and his righteousness declared to a people yet unborn, that he has done it. A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans (4:13-2)

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' ²³Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him', were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

follow me. ³⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.

³⁶For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation,

of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

The Sermon

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, ** and the life of the world to come. Amen.

A Prayer of Spiritual Communion

[When the clergy make their communion if you are watching from home you may like to privately make the following prayer. It was believed from earliest times that Christians could receive the benefits of Holy Communion even if they were unable to be present at the Eucharist. This teaching was of particular comfort to so-called Confessors of the Faith, who were imprisoned and deprived of access to the sacraments].

Jesus, you have given us in the Holy Eucharist your Body and Blood to be our spiritual nourishment through which we may have life everlasting.

I desire, with all my heart, to receive this living Bread which came down from Heaven.

Send your Spirit upon me, come and refresh my soul.

That, whilst I may be isolated from your sacramental presence and from your Body, gathered;

I may know the peace and joy of communion with you and your body the Church, in my heart.

Increase my faith, strengthen my hope, kindle my love, that I may die to self and live but for you. Amen.

For Reflection

The theme of our New Testament reading today is Paul's great thesis in Romans that we are 'justified by faith.' In other words we are made right with God not by our adherence to the law, but first and foremost by our faith. The theologian James Allison writes on the way we derive our unity over and against others. We tend to speak about who we are not, rather than who we are, in his book *Knowing Jesus* he writes:

Our unity is often created at the expense of a victim or victims, at the expense of an exclusion. That is to say it is a unity derived over against some other. And that is to betray the very deepest truth of the catholic faith, the universal faith which by its very nature, has no over-against. The unity which is given by, and in the risen victim is purely given. It is indicative of no superiority at all over anyone else. Anyone who genuinely knows the crucified and risen victim can never again belong wholeheartedly to any other social or cultural, or religious groups. They will always belong critically to all other groups, because all other groups derive their unity over-against someone or some other group.

The whole point of justification by faith is that it is justification by God, not self-justification. The whole problem Luther had with 'works' was that he took the Catholic insistence on good works to be necessarily a source of self-justification. Self-justification is of course when I justify myself over against someone or something else. I am trapped in a defensive, or self-justifying position if I constantly depend on comparison with, or approval from others. That means that my sense of identity, my security is built over-against others, and is not simply, gratuitously given. I am dependent on various ways of showing that I am different, separate, not part of the crude mass of humanity. Self-justification and the sectarian attitude are exactly the same phenomenon. The given-ness of goodness by God, implying the growing appreciation of my similarity to, and my lovability as one of, the crude mass of humanity which is loved by God; the given-ness of justification, and the given-ness of the universality, the catholicity, of salvation, are one and the same phenomenon. In this way the individual and the group simultaneously learn to live without any over-against defining themselves against no one at all. That is a sure sign of a real knowledge of Jesus.
