Dear Friends,

I mentioned in a sermon recently driving my parents to distraction with loud rock music emanating from my bedroom. It was as I said my own form of protest! I'm not too sure what I was protesting about but perhaps simply being a teenager was enough, I didn't need a reason! Music is a valid and powerful form of protest, perhaps the best form, as it is non-violent, creative and its binds us together in a common cause.

A few Sunday's ago, Colin played Beethoven's 'Fur Elise' during communion, one of the best known and loved piano works in the repertoire. At the time I enjoyed it very much, it is very familiar but I hadn't listened to it for a while and it seemed fresh. I thought no more about it and then during the

week I heard this piece again. It was a news item, the Russian police were raiding the homes of opposition leader Alexei Navalny's family. While the police in riot gear, broke down the front door and moved around this small apartment a young woman sat at the piano and played Fur Elise. It was an act of passive defiance in the face of hostility. Something of simple beauty in the face of ugliness and I thought about the Last Supper and our Eucharist in that light and why we do what we do and the manner in which we do it.

In the summer of 1866 the Bishop of London sent the Dean of Westminster to St Albans, Holborn one Sunday morning. He had heard rumours of outrageous worship. The Dean returned to the Bishop's palace 'I saw three men in green' and wisely added 'and you will find it hard to put them down!' What those three were doing is common to many Anglican churches today including our own they were celebrating the Eucharist in such a way to capture and transform the hearts and minds of those they were seeking to serve. The congregation was largely poor, working class folk living in London's slums. The Eucharist was an act of protest against the drudgery, the poverty, the inequality, the disease of 19th century London (and the Bishop)!!

I doubt that many of you think of yourselves as activists, I doubt that Colin does! But this is what we are doing as we celebrate together as we enjoy fine music and beauty – capturing hearts and minds. I look forward to the day we can once again sing our songs of protest!

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that 'all of us possess knowledge.' Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. ²Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; 3but anyone who loves God is known by him. 4Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that 'no idol in the world really exists', and that 'there is no God but one.' 5Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords— ⁶yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. ⁷It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. 8'Food will not bring us close to God.' We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. 9But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling-block to the weak. ¹⁰For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? ¹¹So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. ¹²But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. ¹³Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

A Prayer of Spiritual Communion

[When the clergy make their communion if you are watching from home you may like to privately make the following prayer. It was believed from earliest times that Christians could receive the benefits of Holy Communion even if they were unable to be present at the Eucharist. This teaching was of particular comfort to so-called Confessors of the Faith, who were imprisoned and deprived of access to the sacraments].

Jesus, you have given us in the Holy Eucharist your Body and Blood to be our spiritual nourishment through which we may have life everlasting.

I desire, with all my heart, to receive this living Bread which came down from Heaven.

Send your Spirit upon me, come and refresh my soul.

That, whilst I may be isolated from your sacramental presence and from your Body, gathered;

I may know the peace and joy of communion with you and your body the Church, in my heart.

Increase my faith, strengthen my hope, kindle my love, that I may die to self and live but for you. Amen.

For Reflection

In the Gospel reading, Jesus heals a man who was possessed. But notice that when the demonpossessed man first talks to Jesus, he uses the first-person *plural* pronoun to refer to himself. He says, "What have you to do with *us*, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy *us*? We know from our own painful experience, being double-minded is a kind of slavery to our worst selves.

Why does he say "us"? Why doesn't he say "me"?

The answer, I think, is that although there is only one human body giving voice to these words, there is more than one mind behind the words. That is why that one man's voice says "us" to refer to himself.

When Jesus heals the man, he does so by ridding him of all minds but one, the man's own. In healing him, Jesus makes him single-minded. And so the Gospel calls to our attention what an affliction it is to be double-minded.

Even just dealing with the double-mindedness of long bad habit can be miserable and devilishly difficult. Someone says to you when you are trying to diet and not doing particularly well, "Do you want another helping of pasta?" And what is the answer? *Do* you want more pasta? You do, you know you do, don't you? And yet somehow you really don't either.

And so, as we know from our own painful experience, being double-minded is a kind of slavery to our worst selves.

Real freedom is being able to do what *you* want to do. But if you have two minds about something, which mind is the real you? How can there be one real *you* when you are in two minds about something?

That's why you aren't free when you are double-minded. No matter what you do, you aren't doing what you want to do because there isn't just one you.

Like the demon-possessed man in the Gospel, you will be free only when you are single-minded. But the demon-possessed man was single-minded only after Jesus had healed him.

And so here is the lesson for us. In another Gospel text (John 8:32), Jesus tells his disciples that they will know the truth, and the truth will make them free. For those who will come to Jesus to be freed from their demons, he himself is that healing Truth that will make them free.
