For Reflection

What Is God's Glory?

In John 12 we find a view of God's glory that challenges many modern notions of what the glory of God means. In this passage, we find that Jesus was "troubled" by the cross that lay ahead to such an extent that he wanted to cry out, "Father, save me." But Jesus quickly expresses his resolve to go forward by saying, "No, it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour." Then, with a view towards his crucifixion, Jesus exclaims: "Father, glorify your name," at which point the voice of the Father thunders from the sky: "I have gloried it, and will glorify it again." Jesus then goes on to declare: "when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all people to myself." And just to make sure readers did not miss the point, John adds: "He said this to show the kind of death he was going to die" (Jn 12:27-8, 31-3).

This passage unambiguously identifies Jesus' crucifixion as the "hour" when he will "glorify" the Father's "name." In ancient Jewish culture, to speak of a person's "name" was to speak about their character and reputation. So, Jesus and the Father are both indicating that the Father's character would most clearly shine forth—be "glorified"—when Jesus was crucified. While Jesus reflects the Father's cruciform character throughout his ministry, the Father is "most glorified through the...'lifting-up'... of the Son," as Andrew Moody notes. Similarly, Gary Burge observes that, while God was of course glorified in Jesus' miracles, it is only "on the cross that the mysterious, unfathomable glory of God is to be found."

Colin Gunton argued that "[The glory of Christ is] lived up on the cross, and only through the trial of death is elevated to the glory that is reigning with the Father... if it is true that those who have seen him have seen the Father, then it is the Father who is revealed in the incarnate humanity of this man glorified through humbling."

On top of this, Jesus tells us that it was "for this very reason" that he came into the world. As N.T. Wright puts it, the supreme glorification of the Father on the cross was "the climax and purpose of his whole work." For, as Wright goes on to note, "in being thus 'lifted up'...Jesus will draw all people to himself. How could it not be so, if indeed his cross is the true revelation of the true God, and if what we see in that revelation is the face of love?"

Now, if the crucifixion is the "climax and purpose of Jesus' work," we should understand everything else Jesus taught and did from this vantage point. To put it differently, since the cross was the supreme glorification of the Father, then the many other lesser ways Jesus glorified the Father should be understood as anticipating, and pointing toward, this event.

Let's think about this another way. If Jesus is the centre to which all Scripture points, then the cruciform glory of God that was supremely revealed on the cross must be regarded as the epicentre of this centre. On this note, it's significant that, when the resurrected Jesus "explained... all Scriptures concerning himself" to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, it was primarily to demonstrate that "the Messiah [had] to suffer these things," which the disciples themselves had witnessed (<u>Lk 24:26-7</u>). And later, when Jesus "opened" the "minds" of the apostles "so they could understand the Scriptures," it was primarily so they could see that it declared that "[t]he Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day" (vv.45-6).

Bridging the Gap – Breaking the Cycle. Each week St Philip's donates non-perishable food items to St John's Care in Reid. The baskets at the back of the church are ready to receive your donations! School supplies continue to be much appreciated – these include: back packs, lunch boxes, drink bottles and pencil cases. Also this week there is a need for school lunch snacks, cereals, biscuits, spreads and large tins of tuna. Thank you!

On Thursday evening last Sarah and Tim Gowty (and friends) held a Trivia night to support their fund raising efforts towards the Anglican Board of Mission (ABM). Tim and Sarah were hoping to raise \$6,000 for ABM projects aimed at creating long-lasting solutions to poverty and injustice for overseas and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Communities. On Thursday they raised \$2,077 which brought their fundraising total to \$7,587! A fun evening was had by all! In case you didn't know Ratites are flightless birds, and the smell of rain on dry ground is called Petrichor from Greek petra (πέτρα), "rock", or petros (πέτρος), "stone", and īchōr (iχώρ), the fluid that flows in the veins of the gods in Greek mythology.

Sarah and Tim have signed up to walk 64km of the Larapinta Trail to reach their goal. They are walking in memory of their late father David who was a life-long supporter of ABM and advocate for those most disadvantaged around the world. News from Parish Council

- <u>Special General Meeting</u> A short Special General Meeting (SGM) will be held in the church at 11:15am on Sunday 2 May 2021 to: a) approve the Parish's 2021 budget; b) appoint a Parish Safety Officer; c) elect a People's Warden; and d) note the Rector's appointment of a Parish Council Member.
- Parish Safety Officer Laura Wood has been put forward by Parish Council for the position of Parish Safety Officer. The role of the Parish Safety Officer is to implement the Work Health and Safety Act 2011 (ACT) into our Parish. Under the Act, the nature of health and safety includes both physical and psychological safety. Under Diocesan guidelines, if anyone has any objections, they should lodge them with Revd. Martin at least two weeks before the Special General Meeting on May 2. Subject to receiving no objections, the appointment of Laura will be ratified at the SGM.

Our National Mission for 2021 and 2022 is an ABM project with Wontulp-Bi-Buya College in Cairns. This project continues our support for indigenous Australians and our value for education we supported this Mission in 2015 and 2016.

"The main purpose of Wontulp-Bi-Buya College is to support the development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and men 18 years old and over, through study programs leading to Nationally Accredited Certificates in Theology and Ministry, Suicide Prevention in Social and Emotional Wellbeing, Addictions Management and Community Development."

The Wontulp-Bi-Buya College provides support services in the form of:

- Assistance for Indigenous church and community leaders through study programs (as mentioned above);
 - Regional visits by staff to provide training (where permitted);
 - Provision of college-owned devices that can be loaned out to students; and
 - Provision of online course delivery.

In 2019, the College had 156 enrolments, with roughly two thirds women and one third men. The overall completion rate from the College was 92% and the participation rate for 2020 remained high, even with the challenges of COVID-19. The College continued to provide remote learning opportunities when face-to-face learning could not be offered. We believe that this mission will be a great opportunity to support education assistance for Indigenous Peoples and increase necessary equipment supplies. **Envelopes are available at the rear of the church for your offering.**
