From the Rector

Dear Friends,

The 'Sermon on the Mount' provides us with some considerable challenges, this week's passage perhaps more than most. It is interesting that when Matthew calls upon us to be 'Salt and Light' he says that this will enable others to see our 'good works.' A couple of things about this. First, and importantly, Matthew stresses the reason our good works may be seen is so that God may be glorified, nothing more! But, St Paul, in Romans and Galatians particularly, tells his correspondents that their salvation is to be found not in good works but in faith in Jesus Christ. This is a central piece of reformed theology, what is known as 'Justification by Faith.' It means that we are justified, made right, before God not by what we do but by what we believe, our faith. Many scholars believe that Matthew's teaching on 'Good Works' is meant to be a counter to Paul and what is sometimes seen as a rather passive spirituality, without a moral or ethical imperative. James of course, in his letter, reminds us that 'faith without works is dead.' So how do we understand all this?

Jesus says in the sermon that he has not come to abolish the law, the Torah of the Hebrew Scriptures, but to fulfil it, he says that not one jot of it will be changed. He also says that unless our righteousness exceeds that of the Pharisees – the keepers of the law, we will not enter the Kingdom. This is demanding and challenging stuff! What I think is significant is our motivation. Jesus distils the law down to love of God and neighbour, it is the law of love. So we keep the law not to be right with God as the Pharisees taught, but we strive to keep the law out of love for God and each other. We love because God loved us first. It's a little like the road rules; why do we stick to the speed limit? Our reaction is generally 'because I don't want to get a fine!' The correct response is 'because I want to keep the roads to be safe for all!' Also important is that Jesus lumps us all in together. We are all potential violators of the law. A number of times he says 'the law says this but I say...' Hence his cry of hypocrisy when

dealing with the scribes and Pharisees and indeed all those who want to isolate others from God because they appear to have failed to keep some law or statute.

Christianity then is a faith not based first and foremost on the law but on the Good News, the gospel. It is a religion that emphasises the attitude of the heart before adherence to a set of laws. This has been an important part of Christian culture and is perhaps one of the issues that we face as we assimilate with folk from other cultures and religions. A greater appreciation of these differences will allow us to understand each other better. Let us pray that all people of faith may live and work together for the greater good.

## KEY POINTS FROM FEBRUARY 2017 PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

- At its meeting on 8 February, the Parish Council considered the agenda and papers for the Annual General Meeting (AGM) to be held at 11.15am sharp on Sunday 26 February in the Lamerton Centre.
- After the normal business and elections, the AGM will have three general business items:
  - Rectory Renovation Project
  - Carola Parke Bequest
  - 2017 Review of Mission Program
- The meeting business will be handled as quickly as possible and it is hoped that as many parishioners as possible can remain for the important general business items.
- On the storm damage front, the tree has been removed and the stump ground. A new sign is being made - only the bottom notice box was retrievable. The costs will be largely covered by insurance.
- Work on the Rectory Renovation Project will resume soon. The principal remaining work is landscaping together with a number of other outdoor items.
- The St. Philips Autumn Market will be held on Saturday 1 April from 9am to 1pm.
