From the Rector

Dear Friends

Since Easter we have been without a Chief Shepherd in the Diocese. Bishop Stuart has laid up his Pastoral Staff and with it his authority and responsibility. We are fortunate that in the Diocese we have others in episcopal orders who are able to take the reins temporarily and guide the diocese while the process of selecting a new bishop runs its course. This is very important and I urge every one of us to engage in whatever way we can in this process beginning with prayer.

The clergy of this parish and every parish in the diocese function by holding a licence from the bishop, the 'authority' that comes with a licence is 'derived' from the bishop. When the bishop visits a parish there is no need for a welcome because it is the bishop's parish and the clergy of the parish are his or her delegates. When the bishop comes to St Philip's strictly speaking the priests of the parish have no role because they are only here as his or her representatives, unlike the Deacons whose role it is to serve the bishop. So the bishop is the sign of unity within a diocese.

A bishop is also the holder of apostolicity, and there are (primarily) two ways of understanding this. In one school of thought bishops stand in direct line with the apostles of the New Testament. St Peter is by tradition the first Pope and the bishops of today stand in succession to St Peter. In this way of thinking the bishops are the fount from which the Church is created. Another way of thinking is the Cyprianic model named after St Cyprian, a bishop in Carthage (modern day Tunisia) in the mid-3rd Century. In this model apostolicity is maintained wherever the gospel is validly preached and lived out in – as Jude wrote in his

letter: 'the faith that was once for all entrusted to the saints.' The Church in this model is the fount and the bishops are raised up from within the Church. Whichever model you ascribe to the bishops are central to our understanding of Church in the west and particularly in our Anglican tradition. We having retained the ancient threefold order of Bishop, Priest and Deacon.

So while we think of the bishop as some sort of CEO or manager, above all they are called to be a sign of unity and of continuity with the Church throughout the centuries, that is their primary function and we should be seeking a bishop who will uphold these functions first and foremost; everything else, God willing will flow from that.

We pray for those charged with the responsibility of seeking out worthy candidates to bring before the synod and for the diocese under the care of BP Trevor during this interregnum. If you have any questions or concerns about this process please let me know. I hope you are still basking in the glow of the Easter Candle and finding in it the renewal and energy of resurrection life!
