Hi Everyone,

Everything has its setting... its context! The reporting of the Australian women's rowing eight last week really did not help! It was only normal that members of the team felt disappointed and angry after they had come so close to a medal at the Olympics only to have a team member collapse in the boat. It was as if an interviewer had stumbled into a funeral and been surprised by the uncomfortable feelings there. In such circumstances such feelings abound and catching them in the heat of the action means they are that much stronger. The fact that the events were on display for all to see meant that those of us who are a little squeamish about overt displays of emotion were just a trifle confronted! The great thing about team sports is that winning and/or losing is a team thing and learning to work with the strengths and weaknesses of various individuals is part of the process. It is a good lesson for life in general and it is an especially good lesson for life in the Christian family.

I know how that young rower felt! I have been so exhausted just watching the Olympics this week that I simply fell back in my seat too!

In a similar way there can be no reporting of the up and coming Australian election without the recognition of things happening around us. The war in Iraq, the trial of suspected terrorists David Hicks and Mamdouh Habib, Detention Centres and "children

overboard" allegations are all part of the context. Drought, the concern over free trade with the USA and the management of our health system all add to the mix. There are many other issues as well!

Jeremiah also wrote and spoke in a "context"! His own likely background as member of a priestly family gave him a spiritual outlook in a situation where powerful human forces were at work both beyond Israel and within. The decline of the Assyrian empire opened the way for Scythian raiders to cause havoc and a time of uncertainty. Today we read Jeremiah's early writing expressing concern about his people's willingness to forsake God the source of "living water" and to follow ways which provided no life at all.

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews wrote in the context of failing faith encouraging his readers to look again at the ways in which Jesus covenant surpassed the Law of Moses and the old covenant. The stories of Jesus are in the context of a meal where the Pharisees take the better places. There was a common belief that obedience to the Law of Moses meant a better place in the great banquet of God Jesus however points out that the appropriate response to God's invitation is to abandon ideas of merit. The gift of salvation is to be received with humility and forgiveness or mercy is the active expression of the receipt of the gift.
