The Gifts of the Spirit

Greetings Everyone!

Today is Pentecost "the fiftieth day" of Easter and we celebrate the outpouring of God's Holy Spirit upon the early believers and indeed upon the Church down through the ages. In the Jewish calendar Pentecost was the Feast of Weeks which fell on the fiftieth day after the ceremony of the barley sheaf in the week of Passover. The Jewish year was broken into Pentecostads — periods of seven weeks separated by the various festivals. The Feast of Weeks was also known as the Feast of Harvest and celebrated the conclusion of the grain harvest which had begun at Passover. The festival also began the season for offering the first fruits. It was this Feast of Weeks which had gathered so many people in Jerusalem in the story from Acts chapter 2 when Peter and the apostles were "filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages". It is not surprising that the idea of harvest and first fruits are linked to Holy Spirit.

We so often think of the Holy Spirit as the empowerment of individuals and the one who enlivens believers. Surely that is so, but most of all the Spirit is the enabler of the mission of the whole People of God. Paul in his first letter to the church at Corinth speaks of the believers individual "gifts" inspired by the one Spirit. As one body is made up of many diverse limbs and organs so is the Church composed of many people with a variety of different spiritual gifts. The use of peoples individual "gifts" in the context of the life of the church is difficult to balance but must be the most effective force for mission — just as a body is most effective when all its parts are healthy and working together. I suppose I am looking for help in the discerning and placement of people within the church body (We are The Body of Christ) for the best use of their skills and the best operation of our part of God's family. If we are all feeling useful and fulfilled in our part of the body then the mission (God's purpose) for the Church will happen!

For a long time when we ordained a person as priest we seemed to believe that ALL the gifts were present in that one person. Fortunately we now see things differently and recognise that "WE are the Body of Christ" and that therefore we all have something to offer. Sometimes it is difficult to discern just WHAT it is! Some years ago I served at St Matthew's Karabar (then South Queanbeyan)

where a man called Frank Bowles was a member. Frank was a highly qualified auditor so we naturally thought he would be a good Parish Treasurer! We found to our surprise that Frank had a great gift with puppets telling children's stories! The thing that he was trained and skilled at was not his gift at that time. (Sadly Frank died a couple of months ago.) Sometimes too God gives us a gift to use for a time. Evidently the great author C.S. Lewis thought of his gift for writing was only for some years of his life.

I encourage you to think about what your "gift" is and to be discerning about the "gifts" of others so that we can be more effective in God's mission. "For in the one Spirit we were all baptised into one body Jews or Greeks, slaves or free and we were all made to drink of one Spirit".
