Greetings Everyone,

Today we observe CREATION SUNDAY and welcome Stephen Palethorpe to the pulpit to tell us some of the issues we face in Australia and beyond as we care for the world around us. Creation

Sunday is an opportunity to give thanks for the natural order and to think and pray about what is the most important aspect of our Stewardship of God's gifts.

ALSO TODAY from 11.00am until 1.00pm. Members of the parish are welcome to visit Tim and Shane Woodburn's new "Solar Passive" house at 20 Mulga Street, O'Connor and hear about elements of its design. Many thanks to Tim and Shane for their willingness to share their home with us !

Probably the main environmental issue for us in Canberra and Australia generally is the provision of water. Not only are there concerns in our cities but there is also a strong desire to monitor and restore river flows so that water systems can continue to operate and provide for trees birds animals and fish down stream. The cost of petrol at present must draw our attention to the use of energy, its renew-ability and the availability of its supply. This week the option to use ethanol from renewable sources along with petrol has been more and more an issue. Natural disasters such as the hurricanes Katrina and Rita have put hundreds of oil refineries in the USA out of action and limited the supply of fuel. We all seem to want to use more than we need. I find it difficult to understand how we can afford the economic growth we are told is necessary. We need to put back into the system as much as we take out for it to balance. Just how can we be better stewards of what God has given us?

The Fashion Parade at Pandora's at O'Connor yesterday was a reminder of the benefits of recycling. Not only does recycling save on the energy to create a new object but it often means we save quite a bit of money. I am a great believer in buying second hand or going to places such as Revolve. E-bay also offers a wonderful market place for recyclers.

As I read the first reading about Moses and the "water from the rock" I recall some words attributed to Bishop Burgmann who said that "Moses was a great bushman". It is easy to attribute the discovery of the water in the desert of Sin to a miracle but there are many factors involved. Evidently the Bedouin tribes of the area (like the aboriginal people of Australia) had a wonderful traditional knowledge of waterholes and oases and this event happened at or near one of these places. As in Australia although the land looks most inhospitable there is often an underground water source and Moses possibly from his time as a shepherd in the land of Midian may well have known the signs! I am not trying to say that the water was not God's provision! In fact EVERYTHING is God's gift but we always need to seek search and act to find and make use of these gifts.
