Dear Everyone,

It is good to be back in Canberra and into the work at St. Philips. I had an amazingly productive time at the coast and managed to write up almost all my research data from the Philippines trip. Not only that, the beach and bush were just wonderful and after the stress of the last few months their beauty went a long way to refreshing my soul. The life of faith is really a life long journey - where we learn from the circumstances in our lives and through God's grace grow in inner understanding and knowledge. I have a favourite passage from Paul's letter to the Ephesians (3:14-12). In it Paul prays that through the power of the Spirit his readers 'inner selves' it will grow strong and that God, 'planted in love and built on love' will live in their hearts. There are other passages in the New Testament that point to this 'growing' aspect of the Christian journey. We have a vision here at St. Philips that we will be a community that offers a place to grow spiritually: **The vision of St. Philips is to be a caring, Christian community, which honours and embraces difference and offers a place to grow spiritually within the Anglican tradition.**

'Offering a place' is about hospitality and welcome but it is something specific we have in mind — spiritual growth — not only for those who might walk through the doors but also for ourselves. Perhaps most importantly for ourselves! If we are not growing in understanding and knowledge then I think we are less likely to be able to offer a place that facilitates this for anyone else. What I particularly like about the passage from Ephesians is that it is through the power of the Spirit that growth happens, not through our own convoluted and tortuous efforts which is just as well. All we have to do is to pray and be open to God's love and power in our lives. When the small group of people gather together here on a Tuesday evening for Christian meditation that is part of the process of becoming ever more open to God's grace and love. Singing hymns, praising God, listening to the Word of God, listening to each other (!) are all part of the same process.

As part of my study last week I came across articles that used Max Weber's analysis of world religions as a basis for some reflections. One of Weber's arguments is that religions are transformative phenomena. They are about the transformation of societies and individuals. They are about growth and change. As Christians we choose the path of Christ, we live in Christ, we are renewed in Christ and we proclaim Christ. In a few short weeks we will hopefully be beginning our program of 'offering a place' for others to grow spiritually the 'catechumenate'. (we will have a better name soon!)

Maybe it will be an opportunity for some of us to do some 'spiritual growing' ourselves. It is not only for 'outsiders', brothers and sisters we have not yet encountered, but for those who are signed up members of the church. If you are interested in participating please speak to Sarah Gowty, Linda Anchell, Brian McKinlay or myself. We will also shortly be asking for volunteers to be fellow journeyers, a role that should be wonderfully rewarding. Whatever your intention please pray that the Holy Spirit will guide the team leaders and that we will all indeed grow in faith and love.

Today we welcome Brian McKinlay to the pulpit!!! Many thanks Brian!
