Sunday 26 July 2009

Eighth Sunday after Pentecost

Readings: 2 Kings 4.42-44 Psalm 145.10-18 Ephesians 3.14-21 John 6.1-21

Dear Friends,

A very warm welcome to you as we gather at St Philip's this morning for our Eucharist on this eighth Sunday after Pentecost.

In recent weeks our gospel readings have been passages in Mark which precede and then surround the feeding of the 5000 and its sequel, the walking on water. Now just when we might expect to hear Mark's account of the feeding, the framers of our Lectionary take us away from Mark and switch us to John. Symbolism is very important for all the gospel writers, and Mark seems to have developed the use of bread as a symbol to represent the gospel, and the fact that he includes two stories of feeding, in different locations, further seems to suggest that he wants to celebrate that this good news is both for Israel (5000) and for the Gentiles (4000). However, the switch to John's Gospel for the feeding of the 5000 is not altogether inappropriate because John is very much into symbols and he has developed the symbol of bread even further, to the point where the bread is Jesus himself. John then elaborates this symbol in the long discourse on the theme of 'the bread of life'. Our gospel readings during the coming weeks will take us through this discourse.

At a meeting of the parish's Liturgy Group a few months ago I was asked about the possibility of presenting a series of addresses on the Liturgy in our Order of Service for the Eucharist. The impending gospel readings from John chapter 6 seems to provide a very appropriate context in which to do so, and therefore I will seek to do this on the next three Sunday mornings. If I can make a contribution in this way to an understanding of our worship, then I am very happy to do so.
