From the Rector

Dear Friends

This morning I am delighted to welcome the Rev'd Peta Thorpe who will be our preacher. Peta is one of the chaplains at the Andrew Maconochie Correctional Centre and is a very experienced priest, chaplain and preacher. At St Philip's we have committed to giving a total of \$3000.00 towards the work of the chaplaincy. In 2011 we gave \$1,500.00. Our target for 2012 is the remaining \$1,500.00. The money we donate provides devotional materials and liturgical supplies. This month we keep the work of the chaplaincy in our prayers. There will be a retiring collection.

Also today there is a special Dinka service this afternoon. At the 1.00 pm Dinka service the Rev'd Monica Adua Garang will be presented with her bishop's Authority to Officiate. The Rev'd Monica was ordained in the Sudan over 10 years ago. After a lengthy process her ordination has been recognised in this diocese. She will be licensed to St Philip's and will work closely with Peter Manyok and the rector. This is a wonderful and welcome development and the service will be a joyous occasion to celebrate. Bishop Trevor will preside and preach at the service and all are most welcome to attend. Food will be provided for afterwards by the Dinka Community. Please come and celebrate!

As I write this piece I have been reflecting that it is 10 years since I first turned up at St Philip's and meet many of you. David and I came to Canberra (well David came back and I came to live for the first time) and we were invited to St Philip's by the Gowty family. What a wonderful blessing to land at St Philip's! And well down the Gowty's for inviting people to church! I have been involved in the church on and off all my life but I can say that at St Philip's I found a church that came close to how I hoped church would be. Of course I had changed, become more open, forgiving and understanding over the years so my delight in St Philip's was partly my own attitude - but - it was also the welcome David and I experienced, the support, love and fellowship, the solid liturgy, the great rector (Rob!), the inclusion of all types of people and the outward focus on social justice and transformation, all with a depth of commitment and spirituality. No place is perfect - and neither are you nor I - and Dietrich Bonhoeffer strongly warned against idealism in the church, where we have an unrealistic expectation about what church should be. Idealism in the church is fatal because the church, as they say, is made up of sinner and saint and we are all often both at the same time. We should never expect perfection from each other because we will never get it!

However, my journey at St Philip's has been one of blessing. I was a parishioner here, then an ordination candidate, then a priest-in-charge a few years later and now the rector. So thanks St Philip's but primarily thanks to Christ Jesus who has lead me through 'many toils and troubles', delights and joys and to this place at this time.

ST MARKS EVENTS

Second semester commencement lecture and book launch to be held at St Mark's on the evening of Tuesday 10 July.

The program will commence at 7:30pm with a short commencement service during which we will launch the Reverend Dr Jeanette Mathew's wonderful new book *Performing Habakkuk: Faithful Re-enactment in the Midst of Crisis*.

Jeanette is the Lecturer in Old Testament at St Mark's and a doctoral graduate of CSU. Copies of this fine new work will be available at the special launch price of \$25.

The service will be followed at 8pm by a lecture delivered by Dr Graeme McLean, Senior Lecturer and Philosophy Coordinator at the Wagga Wagga campus of Charles Sturt University. His topic is highly relevant to modern apologetics and contemporary evangelism, theological education and vocational training: "Hating God: How Emotion is Overtaking Reason". Graeme is a wonderful speaker and a gifted Christian interpreter of the "New Atheism". His words will resonate with everyone concerned about the state of public conversation and respectful dialogue. He is especially interested in how philosophy can assist the discipline of theology and the conduct of Christian apologetics. He will be well worth hearing.

News of Interest

Perhaps you were wondering about Alexander Maconochie, the man whom the ACT correctional facility is named after? (*This information comes from Wikipedia!*)

Alexander Maconochie (11 February 1787 – 25 October 1860) was a Scottish naval officer, geographer, and penal reformer.

In 1836 he sailed to the convict settlement at Hobart in Van Diemen's Land (now Tasmania) as private secretary to the Lieutenant-Governor Sir John Franklin. Here he wrote a report strongly critical of the state of prison discipline. The convict system, being fixated on punishment alone, released back into society crushed, resentful and bitter inmates, in whom the spark of enterprise and hope was dead. Maconochie's report "*can be said to mark the peak and incipient decline of transportation to Australia*" when it was given to Lord Russell, the Home Secretary and ardent critic of transportation, claims Robert Hughes. According to his biographer John Barry, Maconochie "*was a deeply religious man, of generous and compassionate temperament, and convinced of the dignity of man.*" His two basic principles of penology were that:

- as cruelty debases both the victim and society, punishment should not be vindictive but should aim at the reform of the convict to observe social constraints, and
- a convict's imprisonment should consist of task, not time sentences, with release depending on the performance of a measurable amount of labour.

Maconochie returned to the UK in 1844 and two years later published a book outlining his system.^[2] This had an immense influence on the development of penology. He died on 25 October 1860 at [Morden](#) in [Surrey](#), still campaigning for penal reform in spite of ill-health. He was buried at St Lawrence Church, London Road, Morden, Surrey.

"Prison is the punishment that keeps on taking. Long after the individual has regretted his or her sin and wishes to go back to living a productive life, he must stay in prison wasting his precious years on this earth. Almost anything you take from a man can be given back except time. He can never reclaim the time that was stolen from him. He can never experience his children growing up for they are already grown. He can never experience those precious moments with his wife for most likely she has moved on. Of all the crimes that man commits to go to prison, in most cases our decision to keep him there is worse. (Anon)"
