. Philip's Care @ Northbourne

(from the co-ordinator, the Rev'd Robin Moors, July report to Parish Council)

I am pleased to say that there are positive things to report. We have been blessed lately. My meeting at the Centre on Thursday 14th of June with the ACT Chief Minister (Katy Gallagher) and the Housing Minister (Joy Burch) - and a very pleasant but unnamed staffer went well. I enjoyed being driven around by the Chief Minister!! (My car was out of action) and it gave us some extra time together. The main focus was on St Philip's Care being able to continue our presence in the area following the massive redevelopment (which will take years to complete). I wanted to show people from the government the physical set-up in which we work. It may seem to be far from ideal, but it works! I was pleased to share with them the richness of this ministry, but certainly did not shy away from the harsh realities and difficult situations that we face. They were very receptive and liked the idea of us working in partnership with Housing through the difficult times ahead.

The Chief Minister is very aware of the contrasting nature of Northbourne Avenue (Canberra's busiest street) - the affluent and business sections contrasting with areas of violence, poverty and at times despair: the struggles with long-term mental illness and the general powerlessness that so many face on a daily basis.

out all the Poverty and Justice Bibles that were given to us by Anglicare via Steve Clarke. I shall soon need the next lot that have been put away for us. They are great bibles, high-lighting God's concern in matters of poverty and justice.

We are among the recipients of the Anglicare Winter Appeal and I have received two deliveries of tined and packet foods and personal care items. I have made up 45 emergency food packages and their arrival was timely as supplies were getting low. It is such a joy to be able to share these things around. Apart from meeting needs, all these things help build relationships and lead to all kinds of conversations and interactions.

From the Rector

Dear Friends

One of my favourite books in the bible is the letter to the Ephesians. Over the last few weeks we have been reading sections of this book at our Sunday services It is a favourite of mine because I think it reveals to us some of the most transformative and amazing outcomes of the Good News of Christ. As one commentary puts it, 'because of their response to the Gospel, the readers are experiencing a radical transformation of their personal and social identity'. Ephesians proclaims that we are God's children through Christ. This is not a warm cozy motherhood statement. As these children we are made for new life, good works and deep and abiding relationship with God. The writer prays that we may be 'filled with all the fullness of God'. In Ephesians we are also presented with one of the most liberating ideas in scripture. In our reading today we hear that Christ is our peace. He has 'broken down the dividing wall, that is the hostility between us'.

In the place and time of Jesus and Paul of Tarsus there were two types of people -the Jews, the chosen people of God and the Gentiles, basically everybody else. In the culture of Jesus and Paul the Jews were 'us' and the gentiles were 'them'. In the Temple in Jerusalem, there was an actual physical barrier (a low wall) between the Court of Israel and that of the Gentiles. Gentiles crossed this line on pain of death. Something's never change. We still live in a world of "us" versus "them", of dividing walls of hostility. We still divide people into the ones we want to associate with and those we want to keep out.

Rowan Williams, the archbishop of Canterbury, says that in the Old Testament holiness was about being ritually and physically pure, being separate from what could contaminate. In the New Testament holiness is redefined as radical openness to the other. How Christ breaks down the walls of hostility is for another reflection but what a message!

At St Philip's we are working at being a place where people feel they can belong. Where we live out this message of inclusion and oneness in God, surely our true place of belonging and purpose. Welcome, hospitality and the building of relationships are how we put into practise the unity we already share with God. Sometimes we, and other Christian communities, do not get this right! We can get caught up in our own prejudices and fears. We can forget that we exist as a church for the other, all others - not for ourselves. We can forget that we can actually only be 'holy' in the New Testament sense if we are 'rooted and grounded in love', that beautiful phrase from Ephesians. Let us then pray for each other, forgive each other our failings and remind ourselves that in the Spirit of Christ and through the grace of God we can indeed be a new creation. Next week I will be in Brisbane for a family occasion. The Rev'd Steve Clarke will preside and preach.

FUNDING PLEDGE FOR THE NEW BUILDING

An essential element of the building project will be parishioner donations as noted by the Parish meeting on 27 May 2012. The minimum target for donations is \$20,000. The pledging process will be open until the end of July.

- An application for some funding from the ACT Government Community Support and Infrastructure Grants program has been lodged.
- The requirements for ACT Planning approval and Diocesan approvals continue to be clarified and worked on.

The Council encourages parishioners to respond to the pledging appeal by the end of July. Unfortunately donations for building projects are only tax deductible if the predominant purpose of the building is for education.

Following the sermon from the Reverend Peta Thorpe, the appeal for funds for the Alexander Maconochie Centre will remain open until the end of July.


MARY SUMNER DAY CELEBRATIONS
