FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

Our gospel reading today is particularly meaningful for us at St Philip's since this is one of the stories where St Philip appears. Not in this version from Matthew but from the account by John! This is the reason that the picture that appears on the bulletin, letterhead, our green altar frontal and various other places is of two fish and five loaves. It is a picture that speaks of the abundance and goodness of God where such a small portion feed over 5000 people. It speaks also of the hospitality, inclusion and care of Jesus. It reminds us that God's provision will always be more than we expect. There is some wonderful hidden symbolism in this miracle account as well. The numbers twelve, five and two have meaning as does the time of year of the miracle, the type of bread and the fish. To look at just one, the number Twelve is the biblical number symbolising God's people. Twelve tribes, twelve patriarchs, and in the new testament, twelve apostles. This story is also full of eucharistic meaning as Jesus takes the bread, looks to heaven, gives thanks and breaks the bread. One of the most central of course is that the loaves are as Pope Francis recently said, a sign of Jesus, the Bread of God for humanity. As we hear this story again and as we notice our loaves and fishes may we be reminded of God's abundant love. As our psalm puts it: *The eyes of all look to you in hope: and you give them their food in due season. You open wide your hand and fill all things living with your bounteous gift.*

Lamentation Sunday – 10th of August (Next Sunday).

At the 2013 session of our Diocesan Synod our Bishop, Stuart Robinson, made an historic apology to those who were victims of abuse. It was felt that this apology needed to be shared and received by the whole Church, and that together we needed to reflect upon the immense effect of abuse across our whole Diocese, and the Church universal. The Bishop has asked that a day be set aside in our diocesan calendar to recognise the pain, hurt and sorrow that has been caused by our actions and inactions relating to such abuse. The hope is that such a day will contribute to healing, forgiveness and reconciliation. It will also raise awareness of our need to be pro-active about creating a safe environment for all people, and the ongoing work of the Church in ensuring that this is so. St Philip's will signify this day with a special liturgy and a public reading of the Bishop's apology at both the 8 and 10 am services.
