From the Editor

Revd Rebecca is on sick leave but is expected back on Thursday; please keep her in your prayers. Revd Jeannette McHugh will preside today and Brian McKinlay will preach.

Today we joyously celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the church on the Day of Pentecost!

We rejoice in the Spirit's presence in our lives. We give thanks for Jesus' promise that the Spirit would be with us to teach us and to lead us in the truth—the Truth that we see in Jesus and his words. We pray that God will work in us through the Holy Spirit.

The word 'Pentecost' simply means the fiftieth day. The Jewish Feast of Weeks was celebrated seven weeks after the Passover and was originally a harvest festival (Leviticus 23.15-22). The old English name for Pentecost, 'Whit Sunday' meant 'white Sunday', for baptisms were performed—just as many were baptised at the first Pentecost; candidates traditionally wore white as a sign of purity. Today we wear red and decorate the church with red to symbolise the fire that appeared on the heads of the disciples—the Spirit's fire.

Don't forget! Mid-week Eucharist is now at 10am on Thursdays, instead of Wednesdays. Morning Prayer is now held in the church only on Fridays, at 8am.
