From the Rector

Dear Friends,

This week at our monthly Family Eucharist we have the added joy of the baptism of Adaife Afamefuna, we welcome her today and her parents Dozie and Chinenye and her Godparents Ambrose, Obiamaka and Chikaodili. Baptism and Eucharist are known as the dominical sacraments because we act and speak them into being following the direct command of Jesus – at the Last Supper: Do this in memory of me and at the end of his earthly ministry: Go therefore and make disciples of all nations baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Despite what many may think Jesus gives us very few commandments. He does however presume that those listening to his words know their Torah – I have come not to abolish the law but to fulfil it. It is in this light that we can read the account of the giving of the Ten Commandments in today's Old Testament reading from the Book of Exodus. Jesus doesn't consider the Ten Commandments from a legalistic perspective; we know, don't we, that he saved his most vehement criticisms for the religious lawyers of his day and their interpretations. Jesus' take on the law is always about relationship; his very nature as the God-man means that he embodies relationship between us and God. And by stating that loving God and neighbour are in effect the two sides of one coin he draws us into an understanding that the way we deal with each other is reflective of our relationship with God. So the Ten Commandments are our foundational text on giving God what is due to God and to each other what is rightly due.

The cleansing of the Temple is all about Jesus breaking down the barriers that we might put in the way of peoples' access to God. In Baptism we speak and act into being the sacrament by which we are brought into relationship with God. This breaking down of barriers and creating relationship is what our faith is all about. It is not about do this or don't do that, it is all about our relationships and what we become by virtue of those relationships.

Today Adaife becomes a Child of God, she is immersed in the waters of Baptism to be reborn and in turn her Godparents and parents promise to instruct her in what that means. It is our role at St Philip's to support them as we will promise to do during the service. Thank you to those of you who attended last week's AGM; the weather rather took its toll that day! I look forward to the new council meeting together to consider how we live out our great calling in the year ahead.
