From the Rector

Dear Friends

As you know we are, at present, in Year B of the lectionary cycle, it is the year of Mark and today, Passion/Palm Sunday, we will hear the account of the Passion from Mark's gospel read in full. Mark's gospel is short on detail and for that reason it was for centuries overlooked. After all why would you read Mark if you could hear Jesus as the new Moses expounding the new 'law' in the astonishing words of the Beatitudes, or listen to him telling the parables of the Good Samaritan or the Prodigal Son or hear the majestic words of the prologue of the fourth gospel. And yet for all this Mark's gospel has this ability to speak to us in

a different way, engage us and more than the others, invite us in. Perhaps that was the intention of Mark to allow us to find a place within the text rather than crowding us out.

As we hear the Passion narrative today listen out for a distinctively Marcan piece. Verse 21 is one sentence, a simple one: *They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus.* We are likely to pass over it such is its simplicity; but I wonder if we are missing something crucially important. We know nothing about these three, Simon and his two sons, Mark typically doesn't elaborate, but is it possible that Rufus and Alexander were known to the folk who first heard this gospel? Did their father return home to Cyrene with a story so extraordinary that these two young men became followers, and part of the community who first heard this account.

I read this recently, which might give us food for thought during this week. *As we stand in the crowd this week, we need to make Simon's journey our journey. The story we tell today, and will tell again and again this week, took place not for some great abstraction, the salvation of the world, but so that ordinary men and women, people like you and me, might have lives that have purpose and shape. Jesus passes us by in the crowd; but for each one of us he will turn and look, he will offer us a chance in carrying his cross, so that we in turn may pass on to our children or our neighbours a hope that life and death, even a violent messy death in the sun outside Jerusalem, is not the end of everything*.*
