From Canon Scott

On this Sunday after Ascension I want to reflect with you about perspective. When I was Rector of St Paul's, Manuka, I said my prayers each morning in the front pew of the church, and my eye was continually drawn to the big stained glass window dominating the sanctuary, depicting the Ascension. On a number of occasions, if I'd come to my daily prayer perplexed about something, or a bit frazzled maybe, or too caught up in all the things I had to do, I found myself drawn to that window and sensed that things were being put into perspective.

Jesus ascended as Lord of all, Jesus caught up into the life of God, Jesus raised in triumph over all the malign and destructive powers in the world: this is the perspective of faith to which Ascension recalls me. What it reminds me is that my life and my activities are caught up into something big, something of profound wonder and worth, something cosmic. I have a share in the ministry of this risen, ascended Jesus Christ—me, for God's sake!—and you too, thanks to our baptism. Here we discover the deepest

meaning of our life, along with the sharpest judgement of how we sell ourselves short in life. All of us share this high calling, though the clergy among us have a special identity in helping others to understand and respond to that call.

The meaning of our life isn't 'get and spend', it isn't 'look out for number one', it isn't 'pursue happiness at all costs', it isn't to be popular, or powerful, or desirable, or any of the other dead ends that people pursue—it isn't to be found within the scope of our own doings at all. Rather, the meaning of our life is to be part of this great and universal movement of love and joy and holiness that Ascension enshrines: God is the meaning of our life, Jesus ascended is the pointer to our destiny, and the Church is the context in which these things are revealed to us and take hold of us.

Jesus' ascension to the Father reminds that he isn't with us in a direct way anymore, but we're to see this positively, not negatively. His journey to the Father reveals at last our proper end, and that of that whole world that God loves. This is the perspective that the Eucharist gives us, as we seek in heart and mind there to ascend, and with Jesus continually dwell, as the old Ascension Day Collect puts it. That way, when we go from this Eucharist back into the world we go with enhanced perspective: about who we most truly are, and about what matters most.

The risen, ascended Jesus in that stained glass window at St Paul's reminded me of how much love, how much reassurance, how much challenge and how much adventure is ours from God, each and every day.
