From the Rector

Dear Friends

The German theologian Jurgen Moltmann is among my favourites. His maxim is 'what cannot be said simply need not be said at all' and when it comes to theology I couldn't agree more! This week we celebrate the feast of Pentecost and next week the Most Holy Trinity, when it comes to theological musings these two are up there with the best of them. Second only perhaps to 'why do bad things happen to good people?'

During our time of leave recently Susan and I were sitting at a coffee shop near an ancient monument, I can't recall which, watching the world go by. Our attention was caught by a youngish woman with a selfie stick. She would take a picture and look at it, then adjust her hair or expression, or pose and take another. We were quite intrigued by her lack of self-consciousness. This went on for some time before she moved on, I guess, to another building, monument or whatever. One of the great joys of travel is the opportunity to discuss your experiences with your travelling companion. Talk about the art or architecture, food or drink you have enjoyed...or otherwise. My initial grumpy reaction to this woman changed to sorrow. How very

sad that she seemed to have no one with whom to appreciate her travels and she even seemed rather uncomfortable with her own company!
Loa Tsu the founder of philosophical Taoism, wrote that 'the person who looks at himself does not shine.' I wondered on this, in this age of the selfie. Moltmann too reflected on this, coming to the conclusion that the origin of the Holy Spirit is the face of God. When you hide your face, they are troubled, or dismayed in older translations, it says in Psalm 104. I have written about this many times before, but travelling across the world and finding exactly the same malaise, the issues of mental health – dismay in folk, has made me wonder once more; when we constantly look upon ourselves we cannot shine. The face of God is a symbol for God's commitment, the attention with which God looks at us. It is our faces that reveal our emotions, our irritation, joy or sadness - the same can be said of God. As a theological student taking services in Nursing Homes and taking communion to the house bound, I was also looking for resources that I could use particularly for pronouncing blessing. I would, more often than not, use the Aaronitic blessing: 'May the Lord bless you and keep you, the Lord make his face to shine upon you, the Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace.' This is the prayer for the Holy Spirit, the special life-giving presence of God among us. Our festival today is none other than a festival of life, it is something I believe that our modern culture could benefit from. Good to be back with you all.
