Today's Readings

A reading from the book of Nehemiah (8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10)

¹all the people gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the Lord had given to Israel. ²Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. ³He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law.

⁵And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. ⁶Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people answered, 'Amen, Amen', lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshipped the Lord with their faces to the ground.

⁸So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

⁹And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, 'This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep.' For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. ¹⁰Then he said to them, 'Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength.'

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians (12:12-31)

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

¹⁴Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵If the foot were to say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶And if the ear were to say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰As it is, there are many members, yet one body. ²¹The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' ²²On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; ²⁴whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, ²⁵that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it.

²⁷Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. ²⁹Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? ³⁰Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? ³¹But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way.

Reflection

Read the text, give the sense. Both matter. The first is given there on the page. The second is risky, a matter of prayer and the Spirit, a deep breath and taking the plunge.

History warns of wrong, sometimes dangerous interpretations. But interpretation is inevitable; not to interpret is still to interpret. History also remembers defining moments when text and interpretation together created a new world. Ezra and his colleagues read the law and explained it, creating not only post-exilic Judaism, but in a measure today's rabbinic Judaism. Jesus read Isaiah and interpreted it, setting the stage not only for his own career but also, in a measure, for his followers to our own time. What could be more dramatic than reading the law code to a

community, defining them as God's people in a new way, causing simultaneous tears and rejoicing? Perhaps only this: reading prophecies which spoke of future blessing, and then declaring that it was already starting to happen.

Ezra's message called forth weeping and celebrating; Jesus' sermon produced both antagonism and loyalty. Luke says that Jesus was already acting 'in the power of the Spirit;' when he applied Isaiah 61 to himself he wasn't simply promoting himself, but explaining what he had been doing. As with other prophecies, being misunderstood came with the package. Ezra had the governor's backing. Jesus stood alone, with Herod not far away, Rome on the Horizon, and hostile listeners ready to pounce. Whatever reception today's expositor may expect, the vocation is the same. Read the text and explain it. Expect it to create and define the community, to evoke joy and sorrow and opposition and enthusiasm. The text may be long forgotten, needing to be dusted down and re-presented. It may be well known, needing to be seen in a new light.

Paul's exposition of the unity of Christ's body provides a case in point. If it were read and expounded before mutually suspicious churches and Christian groupings of our own day; if it were applied in the power of the Spirit to our bizarre and often anachronistic divisions; should we weep in sorrow at our failure to live by it, or throw our hats in the air at the recognition of our real identity and mutual belonging? If someone declared to us that it was time at last for this scripture to be fulfilled, would we reject the proposal as dangerous and unworkable, or would we sign up, take the risks, and go with the new movement?

Paul grounds the unity of the Church in the one baptism into Christ's body. If we find it hard to explain the meaning of baptism today, perhaps this is because we are so used to thinking of different bodies that we can no longer hear what Paul is talking about. Where are today's Ezras called to read and to teach? Where are today's prophets, prepared to say 'Now is the moment for this to be fulfilled'?
