Our artist of today, Eugène Burnand, did not like the religious illustrations that he was familiar with at the turn of the 20th century. He found most of them too pious and not very engaging. He felt he could make an important contribution to religious art by providing illustrations for religious texts that depicted scenes from real life to reinforce the everyday relevance of the stories and message of Christ. As an artist working in the Realist style, he used places and characters he knew. He sets a realistic scene, and we are invited to be part of it.

Our engraving is taken from a series of pictures published in 'Les Paraboles' (The Parables) in 1908. It became very popular and was constantly reprinted. The book features 32 parables and 76 illustrations, each in a separate chapter with text taken directly from Bible.

Update on Rector appointment processes. Following on from last week's Parish Council meeting and today's Special Parish Meeting the first step in the process for appointing a permanent Rector is Parish consultation. The Archdeacon, Paul Cohen will chair a meeting for all Parishioners, which is likely to be in early December after one of the 10am services. The purpose of the meeting is to elicit ideas about your hopes for the Parish and what characteristics you would like in a new Rector. These ideas will feed into the preparation of a broader profile of the Parish to inform interested clergy.

Key Points from the October Parish Council meeting

- **Locum rector**. Parish Council and a member of our Clergy Appointments Board met with Archdeacon Paul Cohen to discuss the appointment of a Locum by the Bishop and from there the process of seeking a new Rector for the parish.
- **Kindy mould and termite damage**. The termite treatment and consequential repair work has been successfully completed. The SPK Early Learning Centre is back up and running after a week's shut down. Parish Council and SPK are reviewing invoices and seeking advice about what aspects are covered by insurance.
- **Timber sleepers**. An energetic band of labourers has removed the timber sleepers from the garden edges to reduce the risk of further termite incursions. Concrete sleepers will be laid in due course.
- **Hot water system**. The leak from the hot water system in the disabled toilet has been fixed. However, a separate electrical issue, as yet unresolved, is interrupting hot water to the Lamerton Centre.
- Safe Ministry training. Parish Council members and relevant clergy will participate in Safe Ministry training to complete Module 3 requirements. The training covers implementation of Diocesan Safe Ministry Policy, Protocols and Procedures including the Child Safe Standards, Reportable Conduct Scheme, screening of workers, Grievance Procedure, Professional Standards and Ministry to Persons of Concern.
