Bible reading for all

The book, *Tripping*, by Thomas Henderson, tells of cold war Bible smugglers and how the East German Stasi tried to



stop them. In the 1980s I met one of the smugglers. Today the Bible is similarly banned in North Korea, for example. We need to appreciate the cost and the ongoing privilege we have of holding the Bible.

William Tyndale (1492–1536) could get no support in England for his project to translate the Bible into English, so he left his homeland. In Germany, he translated the New Testament into English. He used all his private funds to print it and ship it to England. Cuthbert Tunstall, Bishop of London bought most of the shipment and had it burnt outside his cathedral! Yet Tyndale made enough from the first sales to start his Old Testament translation. He moved to Antwerp but was imprisoned there for sixteen months as a heretic, then strangled and his body burnt at the stake.

Tyndale's famous prayer, "Lord, open the King of England's eyes," was answered a year later when an authorised translation based on his work was published lawfully in England in 1537. Tyndale's translation was made directly from the Greek and Hebrew and formed the basis of the Authorised Version of 1611.

There are many daily Bible reading notes available or perhaps you could follow the church lectionary daily. If you are new to Bible reading, you may like to begin with the Gospels. Form a daily habit of reading to sustain you through life. The Bible will often speak to you in your circumstances with wise encouragement, direction and comfort. I have found it so.
