## From the Rector

Dear Friends

The feeding of the five thousand is perhaps among the best known accounts in the gospels, it appears in all four so it was obviously considered important by the gospel writers. In our day of course we are rather hung up with the question 'what really happened.' Some folks are content with the idea that Jesus is demonstrating his divine power, others seeking a more 'rational' explanation claim that the story is all about sharing, and that if we share what we have all will be well and there will be more left over! Neither of the explanations, on its own, is sufficient.

The best commentary on the feeding miracles is that which is provided by scripture itself. We will be hearing this interpretation over the coming weeks. Today we hear John's account of the feeding of the 5,000. Next week will hear that the crowds who were fed clearly misunderstood what it was all about. And the following week we will hear Jesus proclaim 'I am the bread of life.' This is important because this gospel passage will be heard in the context of our Confirmation service.

Our Confirmation candidates have been considering the Passover in their preparation. The 'Old Passover' we learnt about by watching and considering the movie the 'Prince of Egypt.' It is the story of Moses and the Exodus. It celebrates the freedom won for the Hebrews, it is the story that the Hebrew Scriptures revolve around. At the Confirmation service, as we do every Sunday, we will celebrate the new Passover. We celebrate and make present the redemption won for us by Christ and our candidates will make their

communion as adult members of the Church.

Like the Passover the Eucharist is the Church's family meal, which sustains us through the 'desert' of earthly life. It is for all people all races, colours, tongues – the Jew and the Greek. It makes present too the banquet at the end of time when we will all be at one with each other and with God.

Please continue to hold the candidates in your prayers. We have met this week to think about prayer, ways of praying – the different prayers that we use privately and together in worship. Next Sunday we will celebrate the baptism of Olive Jaensch. At this service we will experience together the Passover in its fullest - through the waters of Baptism, our own Red Sea and then in the meal together when we recall our own redemption in Christ. Please keep these dates in your diary as we support these new members of the Church.

As I said in last weeks' note our calling is to hold together both the social and the personal gospel. We can find this played out in these weeks. In our personal faith in the God that feeds each one of us in every way; but also our social responsibilities to reach out and share out of our abundance, in every way.
