

From the Rector

Dear friends,

Our Lenten journey is drawing to a close this week. Next Sunday we will gather with our Palms to re-enact the arrival of Jesus into Jerusalem before we begin Holy Week. I hope you feel that the Lenten season has given you the opportunity to prepare for this great season.

Our Lenten Studies this year have formed part of our year of learning together. Our studies have engaged us in the great narrative of our faith and asked us to use our imaginations as we journey together. We have had the scriptures held up to us like a mirror and we have been challenged... what have we seen reflected back at us? We heard that the 'The drama of God's future must be embodied and implemented by human imagination.' We were asked to imagine a new city, one which was not dependant on commerce, power, authority, law, but one that that was dependent upon God's grace and mercy. So our learning together is not so that we can amass knowledge and then try and explain, it is so that we can fire our imaginations and then transform. All

this is to help create a vision for the future, God's future. Our calling is to continually 'imagine' God's love in our time with its own demands, distractions and issues and then embody that love.

What we are being called to do is to write ourselves into the script, the script being the gospels. In today's passage from John we are reunited with Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary. For the two girls not much has changed. Martha, we are told, served. Mary her sister stays close to Jesus anoints his feet and in an act of extraordinary intimacy dries them with her hair. It is an act of thanksgiving, Jesus has given life to her brother at what will soon be the cost of his own life. Mary shows she appreciates the cost and that she is prepared to offer something costly in return. Might we all say 'I am' Lazarus, in that Jesus left his 'safe country' to enter this world placing his life in mortal danger; to communicate, at the cost of his own life, eternal life to me. I am the friend of Jesus whom he loved, for me Jesus has wept and called me to life stripping away the bands of death. So I am able to engage in the forthcoming passion and death of Jesus with intimate personal involvement, knowing that Jesus in undergoing all this insult and suffering for the love of me and to live to me.

I hope too that in this season we, like Mary, can offer something costly in thanksgiving with our time and devotion.
